


About the Cover



With the theme "Growth and Stability," the 2017 BSP Annual Report Cover goes in line with the BSP Strategy Map: Vision 2025. Recognizing the need to come up with new strategies in providing programs, trainings and services, BSP takes the lead in developing young people to achieve their full physical, intellectual, social, emotional and spiritual potentials as responsible members of their local, national and international communities through a progressive, safe and enjoyable learning environment.

The cover shows the five sectional programs of BSP: KID Scouting; KAB Scouting; Boy Scouting; Senior Scouting and Rover Scouting. The primary objectives of the programs are: a) to develop the young boys and girls to be responsible citizens in the community through proper discipline; and b) to develop basic skill sets through the application of special and essential skills learned through the Merit Badge system.

KID scouting is offered to young boys four to six years old wearing light blue neckerchief. KAB

Scouting is offered to young boys six to nine years old wearing yellow neckerchief. Boy Scouting is for boys 10 to 12 years old wearing green neckerchief. Senior Scouting is for boys and girls 13 to 17 years old wearing red neckerchief. Rover Scouting is the final phase offered to young boys and girls aged 16 to 24 wearing navy blue neckerchief. Rovers aged 24 and above are called Rover Peers.

The cover also displays the assets of BSP, which when utilized and managed properly, will ensure that majority of the organization's budget will come from these, thus making BSP less dependent on membership fees. Effective and efficient deployment and allocation of resources will improve the organization's financial stability and self-reliance.

"Growth and Stability" will lead the BSP Strategy Map: Vision 2025 to fullness, fostering BSP as foremost in preparing the youth to become agents of change in communities, guided by the Scout Oath and Law.

INVESTITURE AND INSTALLATION CEREMONIES OF PRESIDENT RODRIGO R. DUTERTE AS CHIEF SCOUT



President Rodrigo R. Duterte was officially installed as the new Chief Scout of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines (BSP) during the Baden Powell Day of the World Scout Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) in an Investiture Ceremony held in Malacañan Palace on April 3, 2017. The members of the BSP welcomed the new Chief Scout President Duterte with a warm and snappy salute.

Through traditional investiture rites, President Duterte assumed the post vacated by his predecessor, former President Benigno Aquino III by virtue of Section 4 of Republic Act 7278 which states that the President of the Philippines shall automatically become the Chief Scout of the BSP.

The investiture ceremony was witnessed by some members of the Diplomatic Corps, World Scout Bureau – Asia Pacific Support Center, BSP National Executive Board, BSP National Office, Scouting-Related Groups (BSP Past Presidents, National Commissioners and Deputies, Council Scout Executives, Local Council Executive Board, 11th WSJ Foundation, 6th ASEAN Project Management Team-Tagum City Council), Scouting friends and partners (DepEd Regional Directors, International Youth Fellowship, Girl Scouts of the Philippines, Office of the Presidential Assistant for Special Concerns), Scout leaders, Scouts representing the five-sectional program of Scouting (KID, KAB, Boy, Senior, Rover) and the community-based Scouting group "Ticket to Life" – Manila.

Change for the better.


We need to change, innovate and think of ways that will make Scouting better today than it was yesterday. We need to make things happen and make it work like what our predecessor did.

predecessors resorted to innovation. Now is the time to do better than that.








Message The Chief Nat'l Commissioner



CHAPTER 1 ORGANIZATIONAL ORGANIZATIONE

The governance of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines should be transparent, accountable and efficient and clearly linked to its overall strategy, focused on achieving Membership Growth as its Major Final Outcome. Organizational Excellence raises the bar of excellence in membership development and strengthens the capacity of the Local Councils to improve communication strategies, marketing and public relations, accurately portraying Scouting's image as leaders of positive change. It also focuses on Governance, Performance Management, Risk Management and Disaster Response. To achieve this, roles and responsibilities of the personnel and the offices at all levels of the organization should be clearly defined and understood, ensuring synergy across all levels of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines.



PROFESSIONAL SERVICE IN THE BOY SCOUTS OF THE PHILIPPINES

The Boy Scouts of the Philippines had 134 plantilla positions in 2017. However, only 90 of the available positions were filled up, leaving the remaining 44 positions vacant. Of the total 159 workforce, there were 90 regular employees and 69 contract of service personnel.



BSP ONE ACCOUNTING

Pursuant to Executive Committee Decision No. 31, 2017 dated 08 September 2017, the accounting units of Finance Division and the National Scout Shop were merged into one and will soon be headed by a Chief Accountant and supervised by the Director for Finance. The merging aims for efficient and effective financial management and reporting as required by the Commission on Audit (COA) and the Governance Commission for Government Owned or Controlled Corporation (GCG). This will also minimize redundancy of procedures and transactions.

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS, PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

Capacity-Building Activities

In line with the BSP Strategic Priority on Organizational Excellence aimed at enhancing the capacity and knowledge of employees on various areas of specialization, the Administration Division conducted series of capacity-building activities (equivalent to 216 training hours) to 229 employees, including COS personnel and 214 Local Council staff.

An Advanced Training Course for Leaders of Adults (ATC-LOA) with Course Recognition Number ATC LOA 17-137 was conducted on 16-17 March 2017 at the BSP-National Office and on 23-25 March at the Makiling National Scout Reservation, Mt. Makiling, Los Baños, Laguna for 24 National Office staff. The trainees were awarded their Certificate of Attendance for completing the required 83 training hours. After completing the Leader Training requirements, the 24 trainees received their Woodbadge Parchment on 27 March 2017.

The Course staff recommended 10 of the 24 participants to take Course for Managers of Learning (CML).





FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

In partnership with the Bureau of Fire Protection-Arroceros Station, a Fire Safety and Prevention Seminar (with Drill activities) was conducted on 29 March 2017 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the BSP-National Office with F/Insp Generoso M. Juico as resource person. A total of 99 BSP employees and COS personnel participated in the seminar.







SEMINAR-WORKSHOPS ON GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

The BSP, in cooperation with the WOSM-APR Support Centre and through the Messengers of Peace (MoP)-Support Fund, conducted a series of Seminar-Workshops on Government Operations (SWGOs) for the following Scouting Regions:

llocos Region/Northeastern Luzon Region/Central Luzon Region 4-8 April 2017 @ the Highland Villa Hotel & Resto, Baguio City



Southern Tagalog Region/Bicol Region 26-30 April 2017 @ Makiling National Scout Reservation, Mt. Makiling, Los Baños, Laguna





Eastern Mindanao Region and Western Mindanao Region 5-9 June 2017 @ Malagos Scout Camp, Malagos, Davao City



National Capital Region, Eastern Visayas and Western Visayas Region 19-23 June 2017 @ Capitol Hills Scout Camp, Cebu City



The SWGO was partly funded by the WOSM-APR Support Centre and the MoP program in the amount of US\$25,000 and by the BSP amounting to PhP1,000,000.00.

A total of 214 Local Council Scout Executives, Officers-in-Charge, Finance Officers, Bookkeepers, Accountants and Registration Officers (92% of the targetted 240 participants) participated in the series of Seminar-Workshops.

The seminar-workshop equipped the Local Council Scout Executives and managers with knowledge and skills in complying with certain government laws and policies as it trained the Local Council Finance Officers/Bookkeepers and Accountants on government budgeting, auditing and procurement (RA 9184, RA 6713 and EO 203).







Sessions on government accounting and auditing rules and regulations, financial reporting system, the Compensation and Positions Classification System (CPCS) for GOCCs, personnel policies, rules and other pertinent government issuances for GOCCs were presented by resource speakers through lectures, presentation, group discussions and exchange of ideas and case studies.

The participants said that SWGO substantially achieved its goals and objectives in terms of equipping the target participants with knowledge and skills in complying with government accounting and auditing rules and regulations, financial reporting, CPCS, personnel policies, rules and regulations and other pertinent government issuances for GOCCs. They also expressed confidence that the seminar-workshop would greatly guide and help them manage their Councils as required by the government.

PUBLIC FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT COMPETENCY PROGRAM

Around 16 employees and COS personnel from Finance Division, Administration Division and Office of the Internal Audit attended the Public Financial Management Competency Program-Track 1 conducted by the Department of Budget and Management and funded by the Australian Government. The seminars were held on 23-25 October, 25-27 October; and 22-24 November.

The Program seeks to enhance the technical competencies of Public Financial Management (PFM) practitioners in oversight and spending agencies. It makes on-going training and learning solutions available to PFM practitioners to support effective job performance and career growth, while supporting the broader PFM reforms for improved transparency, accountability and delivery of services.

BASIC ORIENTATION FOR COS PERSONNEL

On 19 September, the Administration Division-HRM Office conducted Basic Orientation for six new COS personnel of the National Office. The COS personnel were given insights on Human Resource Policies focusing on the required documents for hiring of COS, procedures for contract renewal with corresponding forms for renewal of contract, timekeeping and attendance, leave, tardiness and undertime, compensatory overtime credit and compensatory time-off, official travel/official business; and other BSP office policies.



PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

Group Planning Workshop

Consistent with the BSP-SPMS and CSC MC No. 6, s. 2012, all BSP Operating Groups conducted a two-day Group Planning Workshops for 150 BSP employees and COS personnel in February and March 2017. The outputs were the Operating Groups' Office Performance and Commitment Review (OPCR) and Individual Performance Commitment Review (IPCR) for 2018; Project Procurement Management Plan (PPMP) for MOOE and Capital Outlay for 2018; Group Budget for 2018 and Profile and Requirements of Programs, Projects and Activities (PPAs) for 2018.

2017 National Mid-Year Performance Review and Budget Planning Workshop

Consistent with BSP's thrust to further improve and develop the capacity and capability of the staff in performing their functions and to prepare the Corporate Operating Budget (COB) for 2018, the BSP conducted the 2017 National Mid-Year Performance Review and Budget Planning Workshop on 1-4 July at the El Grande Resort and Hotel, Lipa City, Batangas. Ten BSP officials and employees composing the Senior Management Team, Regional Scout Directors, Executives and Officers participated in the workshop.





2017 National Year-end Performance Review

The National Year-End Performance Review, which was held on 16-18 December at the BSP National Office, aimed to evaluate the performance of BSP based on the collective performance of the various operating groups or units for the period January to November; consolidating and reviewing the Office Performance and Commitment Reviews (OPCRs) of all operating units against the success indicators, and expenses against the budget; finalizing the Programs, Projects and Activities (PPAs) for 2018 based on the approved 2018 Corporate Operating Budget (COB) and finalizing the 2018 Calendar of Activities. Around 40 officials, executives and officers of the BSP Management Team participated in the review.







GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

2017 National Women's Month Celebration

As part of its Gender and Development Activities, the BSP participated in the celebration of the 2017 Women's Month anchoring on the theme "We Make Change Work for Women." This is in response to President and Chief Scout Rodrigo R. Duterte's directive, in his first State of the Nation Address (SONA), to fully implement the Magna Carta for Women to ensure that men and women will be partners in the pursuit of the country's economic, social, cultural and political development.

The following activities highlighted BSP's participation to the National Women's Month Celebration:

- a. Use of the All-Women Cast "LupangHinirang" video in all activities conducted in March
- b. Forum on Magna Carta of Women on 21 March 2017 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 nn at the BSP-National Office with 90 participating National Office employees and COS Personnel. Mr. Rey Jose S. Soriano (Media Production Specialist III of the Occupational Safety and Health Center-Department of Labor and Employment, and also an accredited Gender and Development (GAD) trainer by the Philippine Commission for Women served as the resource person.





During the 1st Quarter Fellowship held on 30 March 2017 at 2:00 p.m. at the BSP-National Office, and which was participated in by 80 staff, a powerpoint presentation entitled "Tribute to the Women in the BSP" focusing on the worth of women in Scouting was shown to the participants. The fellowship also recognized the 36 birthday celebrators for the months of January to March.







HEALTH AND FITNESS PROGRAM

Medical Health Insurance for BSP Employees

A total of 20 BSP employees voluntarily availed of the medical health insurance coverage by Cebuana Lhuillier in partnership with Philam Life.

Physical Fitness Center and Provision of Fitness Center Sports Equipment

As part of its Gender and Development Program under the Healthy Lifestyle Program, the management opened the Physical Fitness Center located at the 6th Floor-South Wing of the National Office on 15 June 2017. At least 50 BSP staff initially enrolled in the program. Aside from the gym, Zumba Class is also available on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Two fitness instructors (one gym instructor and one zumba instructor) were hired on contractual basis.







SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

2017 BSP National Mid-year General Assembly, 2nd Quarter Fellowship and Sportsfest

The 2017 BSP National Mid-year General Assembly, 2nd Quarter Fellowship and Sportsfest were held on 4-7 July at the El Grande Resort and Hotel, Lipa City, Batangas. It was participated in by 140 staff from the National Office, Regional Offices and Camps.

During the 3-in-1 event, the employees were updated on management concerns and strategic directions on administration, finance and field operations as well as on various BSP Programs, Projects and Activities (PPAs) and plans for 2018. The importance of good health and fitness was also fostered among BSP officials and employees through the Sports Festival and other social activities.









81st BSP Charter Anniversary and National Scouting Month

The BSP marked the 81st BSP Charter Anniversary and National Scouting Month with series of activities facilitated by the Field Operations Division and Administration Division on 02 October and 27 October, respectively.

Kick-off and Opening of the Scouting Month (October 2) at the Veranda, 4/F, BSP-National Office with 150 participants



80th BSP Charter Anniversary Celebration, Awards and Recognition Ceremonies and 3rd Quarter Fellowship (October 27) with 120 participants. The culminating activity consisted of four parts: Thanksgiving Mass, Loyalty Awards, 3rd Quarter Fellowship, and Anniversary Luncheon.

SCOUT MEMBERSHIP



In 2017, a total of 2,484,444 Scouts registered from the ten (10) Scouting regions of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines. Boy Scouting has the highest number of Scouts registered among the five sectional groups, with 983,891 or 40% of the total Scout membership. KAB Scouting ranked second with 809,111 Scouts (33%), Senior Scouting with 457,152 Scouts (19%), KID Scouting with184,510 Scouts (7%) and Rover Scouting with 14,201 Scouts (1%). A total of 33,925 Scouts were also registered under the Community-Based Scouting program.

The 2017 Scout membership showed a slight increase of 3% from the 2016 Scout Membership of 2,421,880. It also represents a 28% accomplishment rate in terms of membership potential of 8.67M Scouts, and an astonishing 98% accomplishment rate in terms of membership goal of 2.53M Scouts.

ADULTS AND LAY LEADERS

A total of 155,617 Unit Leaders and Assistant Unit Leaders from 84,709 Scouting Units registered and rendered their service to the Boy Scouts of the Philippines in 2017. This figure is almost the same as the previous year's total of 155,567. The ratio of Unit Leader to Scout remains at one Unit Leader for every sixteen Scouts (1:16). Around 49, 411 Lay Leaders and other Volunteer Leaders registered in 2017.



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
FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Overview

Every registered member of the BSP is entitled to a cash assistance when hospitalized or in need of medical attention due to accident. If a member dies due either to accident or natural cause, beneficiaries of the deceased are entitled to financial assistance for burial or bereavement purposes.

Distribution of FAP Claims Per Scouting Region


The BSP disbursed a total of Php 2,073,271.76 to cover processed, approved and released FAP claims. Table 1 shows distribution claims in terms of percentage and peso value per region:





FAP Claims Per Nature of Case

The highest claims reimbursed in the year under review were of Patient Medical Reimbursement cases which posted a total of Php 1,229,270.65 or an equivalent of 59% of the aggregate cash assistance benefit. It was followed by Out-Patient Medical Reimbursement cases amounting to Php 497,329.11 or 24% of the cash assistance provided. Next in the list are: Accidental Death Cases -- Php 260,000.00 (13%); Natural Death Cases -- Php 77,500.00 (4%); and Dismemberment Cases -- Php 9,172.00 (0.44%).




Financial Assistance to Local Councils which have registered at least 20% of Membership Potential





PROMOTIONS

In order to attract more young people and adults to join Scouting, the Public Relations and Communications Office continued to distribute Membership Posters in 2017 during the conduct of National Events, and whenever necessary as requested by the local councils. WEBSITE CONTENT MANAGEMENT (WCM): FOCUSING ON THE BSP STRATEGY MAP: VISION 2025

The BSP needs to excel on the thematic of the Strategy Map – Development Orientation and Good Governance in order to sustain BSP's growth. Under each theme, there are specific key strategic priorities that the Website Content Management Committee (WCMC) has recognized to come up with relevant action steps to fulfill BSP's vision. Development Orientation consists of Young People, Adults in Scouting and Community Involvement. On the other hand, Good Governance involves Resource Management and Organizational Excellence.

The WCMC, tasked to supervise, promote, develop and maintain the website, made significant accomplishments in line with the BSP's Strategy Map: Vision 2025 using BSP's Information and Communications Technology (ICT) in-house capacity (as of 2017). The website continuously serves its purpose by being a key player in the exchange of real-time information from among the general populace.

Significant Accomplishments on Young People

- Supported the BSP's operating units in the online circulation of policies and guidelines related to Scouting programs, projects and activities.
- Executed online publication and distribution of new reference materials of the revised program thrusts of different Sectional Programs thru officially sanctioned e-mails, social media accounts and website of the BSP.
- Assisted in the issuance of memoranda (via e-mail, website posting and/or social media accounts) integrating the advancement requirements in all Scouting activities. This is in line with the BSP's objective of annually increasing the number of Scouts who will be advanced to the next higher rank.

Significant Accomplishments on Adults in Scouting

- Assisted in the full implementation of the BSP Adults in Scouting Policy by uploading downloadable copies of all new reference materials to the Adults in Scouting official website.
- Assisted in the strengthening of Adults in Scouting and implementation of World Programmes by uploading and distributing revised and updated training program materials, references and resources to all Scouting Regions and Local Councils.
- Created an Adults in Scouting database and strengthened the management system to provide accurate and updated Awards Scheme and Recognition to all Adults in Scouting



Significant Accomplishments on Resource Management

 Assisted in formulating effective tools in establishing transparency and accountability on the resources of the organization through online publication of bids for the awarding of lease on identified properties.

Significant Accomplishments on Organizational Excellence

• Supported the effective management of the organization's image through proper maintenance of BSP's comprehensive and updated website that will serve both as an internal and external communications tool.

Significant Accomplishments on Community Involvement

 Published promotional materials in order to increase the number of registered Community-Based Scouting units in Local Councils.

Website Audience Metrics

Using Google Analytics in evaluating the website's performance, report shows that in 2017, the website's online presence has grown exponentially since it was launched in 2015.






Figure 1 shows a comparison of the BSP website's performance of 2016 and 2017. Below is an in-depth explanation of terms used in the above figure:

- **Session**: This represents the number of times a user was active on the website.
- **Users:** This represents the number of unique visitors who have visited the website.
- Page Views: This represents the number of pages that were viewed on the website.
- **Pages/Session**: This represents the average number of pages that were viewed in a session
- Bounce Rate: This is the percentage of users who only visit one page of the website
 and leave.

As of 2017, the BSP website has reached 612, 612 page views which is **63.75% higher** to that of 2016. The BSP website has accumulated 125, 562 sessions, which is **71.91% higher** compared to last year's 73, 041. Another parameter that has shown significant improvement is the number of new visitors acquired from 51, 817 users in 2016 to 90, 736 in 2017, a remarkable **75.11% growth**.

One of the WCMC's objectives is website exploration, an objective met with an exceptional result. From 9.19% bounce rate last 2016, it has dropped off to 2.60% this year. A decline in this metric means that out of the 125, 562 sessions recorded this 2017, 2.60% of it are users who only visited one page of the site, the remaining 97.04% of which are users who explored multiple pages of the website, signifying interactivity and user engagement.





Website Audience Acquisition

Figure 2 shows where exactly the website traffic/visitor is coming from and how users are being referred to the website. 74.8% of the website traffic came from "organic search" or from unpaid search engine listings, e.g. a Google.com search or a Yahoo.com search. This metric clearly shows that majority of the users search for information online, which the WCMC never failed to recognize by providing relevant and updated information. Next to the "organic search", which recorded 17.4% of the traffic source came from the "direct" source or from visitors who visited the site by typing the URL directly in the browsers, including visitors who clicked from bookmarks and untagged links within e-mails. It is evident from this metric, that the officially sanctioned emails of the BSP are being utilized. With vast and diverse website traffic sources including social media and website referrals, report shows that for the year 2017, the WCMC has been actively contributing in making the BSP's online presence felt across its users.





TUROK LISO, TUBO PISO PROJECT (TLTP PROJECT)

In general, TLTP serves as a catalyst for the community to achieve a healthy agricultural environment which promotes sufficient, income-generating and safe food production for families and institutions.



THE SCOUT YOUTH FORUM

Involving the Young People in Decision-Making in Scouting

"Scouting is a Movement of young people, supported by adults; it is not a Movement for young people managed by adults only. Thus, Scouting offers the potential for a learning community of young people and adults, working together in a partnership of enthusiasm and experience."

(Policy on the Involvement of Young Members in Decision-Making Adopted by the World Scout Conference thru Resolution 2/93)

Over the past 30 years, the World Scout Conference has addressed the resounding issue of the participation of young members in decision-making. In 1969, the Conference encouraged National Scout Organizations and Regions to arrange youth conferences and youth forums. In 1993, the World Scout Conference adopted a policy on the involvement of young members in decision-making. The same World Scout Conference adopted a resolution on Youth Forum, which provides an opportunity for young people to develop the necessary practical skills to enable them to take part more effectively in decision-making activities and undertake leadership roles within and outside the Movement.

The Boy Scouts of the Philippines (BSP) has responded to the call of the times, empowering the young people through their inclusion in the various policy-making body of the movement - two (2) Council Scout Representatives to the Local Council Executive Board, two (2) Regional Scout Representatives to the Regional Scout Committee, and one (1) Regional Scout Representative each from Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao to the National Executive Board. More importantly, the inclusion of one (1) Senior Scout, each from Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao [Regional Scout Representatives] to the National Executive Board (NEB) has been in effect since 31 October 1936 by virtue of Commonwealth Act No. 111. Representation is also encouraged at the level of the Institutional Scouting Committees (schools and sponsoring institutions) and the District Scouting Committee (municipalities, scholastic districts, area, etc.).

They [the young people] were afforded and are continuously being afforded direct representation, highlighting the ability of young people to formulate their own decisions and help the adults in the development and introduction of several programs for the movement, consistent with its thrusts, through the Scouts Youth Forum.

Affording direct representation of the young people from diverse backgrounds and involving them in the decision-making process not only provides them with the space to have a say on issues that affect their lives, but also provides them with the perfect opportunity to directly address these issues and their preference. The perspective of the young people as to how to further enhance and improve the programs of Scouting is of paramount import in the decision-making process – they offer fresh air and creative ideas – after all, millennial are the market segment of the Scout Movement.

By involving young people in decision-making processes in Scouting, the BSP is not only fulfilling its Mission and respecting the Scout Method, but also supports both young people and adults to reach their full capacities and engage in constructive dialogue in order to contribute to the dynamism and democratic character of the organization [BSP] as a whole.

NATIONAL SCOUT YOUTH FORUM (NSYF)

The National Scout Youth Forum is the final leg of the Scout Youth Forum where young people are empowered to develop their capacities for making decisions that affect their lives and of other people, and, engage in decision-making in the groups where they belong, for them to be able to actively contribute to creating a better world.

The Scout Youth Forum, a primordial part of the Youth Development Program, is organized to fill the need and the clamor for youth participation, involvement, engagement and empowerment in the decision-making process, especially in matters and issues directly affecting them, and serve as a laboratory for the development of leadership qualities and capabilities among our young Scouts.

The Scout Youth Forum is also an educational tool to support the process of developing youth participation. It is an event that empowers and inspires young people through participatory approach, helping them to develop skills in decision-making which can be used within Scouting and in the society. The Forum is a place for information, training and concrete experience of discussing and acquiring a deeper understanding of various issues. It is also a source of inspiration and a venue for young people to share and learn fresh ideas, innovative thoughts, different experiences and working methods.

In 2017, the BSP conducted National Scout Youth Forums each for Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao, in conformity with the New Guidelines in the Conduct of the Scout Youth Forum issued in February 2014. The final leg of the Scout Youth Forum were conducted under the following details:

- National Scout Youth Forum for Luzon Rizal, Gubat Sorsogon 9-12 March 2017
- National Scout Youth Forum for Visayas
 Manocmanoc National High School, Boracay Island,
 Malay, Aklan
 9-12 April 2017
- 3. National Scout Youth Forum for Mindanao Macapagal House, Timuga, Iligan City, Lanao del Norte 3-5 March 2017

The participants discussed and shared topics which are of interest to them and those which directly affect them, using democratic methods, particularly the Parliamentary Rules and Procedures in order to ensure maximum participation of every participant while safeguarding their fundamental rights.

The forums cover several plenary sessions with their respective officials presiding over. In each of the plenary session, there were several plenary discussions and debates that transpired. Every discussion crew presented their respective topics and subjected the same for interpellation.



Regional Scout Representatives

One of the most important feature of the National Scout Youth Forum is the election of the Regional Scout Representative for Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao to the National Executive Board.



YOUTH PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT



The new Vision of the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) states that, "By 2023 Scouting will be the world's leading educational youth movement, enabling 100 million young people to be active citizens, creating positive change in their communities and in the world based on shared values.

Corollary, the Vision 2020: APR Plan 2012 – 2015 of the World Scout Bureau – Asia-Pacific Regional Support Centre (WSB-APRSC) provides that "By 2020, Scouting in the Asia Pacific Region is recognized as the preferred and leading educational youth movement offering relevant programme in all segments of society." Towards the achievement of this Vision, the APR Scout Committee approved its Five (5) Strategic Priorities for 2015 – 2018: Young People, Adults in Scouting, Management, Finance and Scouting Profile.

Aligning its strategic directions with WOSM and WSB-APRSC, the Boy Scouts of the Philippines (BSP) had recently approved its own roadmap – BSP Strategy Map: VISION 2025. It outlines the strategic objectives and the focus areas that the BSP will be undertaking over the course of the next ten (10) years in order to achieve its Major Final Outcome – Membership Growth.





The BSP Strategy Map: Vision 2025 provides policies and guidelines that supports the Local Councils in the delivery of quality Scouting programs, projects and activities to all young people in all segments of society with greater emphasis on the following:

- o Support Local Councils in implementing WOSM World Programmes consistent with the development thrust of the BSP to ensure innovative and relevant youth-oriented educational program to attract young people and drive membership growth.
- Offer greater opportunities to young people in leadership roles and governance through participation and involvement in the decision-making processes youth empowerment and development.
- o Assist Local Councils to create more opportunities for greater involvement of young people in creating better communities through service projects related to environment education, development education and peace education through partnerships.

The Program Committee of the BSP created a task group that was assigned to update the BSP Youth Program for implementation in 2018. New passports for Boy Scouts and Senior Scouts, and a new program for Rover Scouting will also be released in 2018.

BETTER WORLD PROGRAMME

The Boy Scouts of the Philippines is at the forefront of the WOSM World Scout Programme, a framework for Creating a Better World.

Scouting is all about young people – building values (Scout Oath and Law) in them, developing them to be active citizens and leaders of their community and the world, and empowering them to take action as responsible and committed citizens.

It is therefore important that World Scouting has exciting and innovative programmes and activities that will draw the attention of these young people to join and be involved, and to contribute to positive changes in their communities.

Recognizing this, World Scouting strives to continuously offer opportunities and channels that will truly enhance young people to be the catalysts of change, addressing global issues in their local communities through volunteerism, internships, community services and partnership projects with other non-governmental and governmental organizations. Over the years, these have morphed into, what is now called, the World Scout Programmes, comprising the Scouts of the World Award, World Scout Environment Programme and Messengers of Peace.







SCOUTS OF THE WORLD AWARD (SWA)

The SWA challenges all young people (Scouts and non-Scouts) aged between 15 and 26 years to reflect on global issues and act on them at the local level. It is the only award for young people that is provided by World Scouting. It aims to encourage stronger involvement of young people in the development of society. Launched in 2004, the SWA is one of World Scouting's contributions to the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

WORLD SCOUT ENVIRONMENT PROGRAMME (WSEP)

The importance of the environment to Scouting was highlighted at the 37th World Scout Conference in 2005. In 2006, the Educational Methods Committee, through the Environment Education Task Team, developed the World Scout Environment Programme, introduced a new World Scout Environment Badge, launched SCENES (Scout Centers of Excellence for Nature and Environment), and established and maintained effective environment partnerships.



MESSENGERS OF PEACE (MoP) Initiatives

The MoP is a global initiative of World Scouting, which aims to inspire millions of young people throughout the world to do amazing things in their communities to create a better world. Since 2012, Scouts have been sharing their community service initiatives online on scout.org. To date, more than 620,000,000 service hours have been registered in over 40,000 community service initiatives. This has contributed to building a strong sense of purpose among Scouts Messengers of Peace.

Through these World Scout Programmes, under the "Better World" framework, World Scouting hopes to develop generations of active citizens who are committed, responsible, and endowed with critical thinking to examine and potentially challenge the status quo using the principles of democracy. The World Scout Programmes aim to motivate the "active citizen" within each young person (Scout or Non-Scout) and move him/her to take concrete actions on issues that affect his/her local community to create a better world in a Global Network of Service, as envisioned by Baden-Powell.

Teams from Zamboanga del Sur - Pagadian City Council focused on the environmental protection by coastal clean ups and mangrove planting. Scouts from Cabanatuan City and Tacloban City helped in the improvement of school facilities during Brigada Eskwela. Scouts from

Bohol Council made a Sci-Hi facility in their school to help students to be more inclined with Science and Technology while having fun.

A team of Scouts from Rizal Council and a lone Scout from Cebu Council started a Community-Based Unit inside the juvenile prison in their city. This hardworking and passionate Scout goes weekly to teach children and teenagers Scout skills and character building lessons. This only proves that no matter how challenging it can be, as long as you have a big heart and the right mindset, you'll be able to do something great.

Other Teams choose to do literacy programs outside the four corners of classrooms like the teams from Camarines Sur Council and Metro Manila South Council. The team from Metro Manila East Council focused not just on literacy, they also renovated a community library in their neighboring municipality. From an old box-like building, it has now become a child-friendly facility with hundreds of books and continuous weekly lessons for the kids. They also gave out 100 brand new toys to the children in the ALIVEbrary program. These are just few of the thousand projects that can be implemented through this Better World Program.

Through the collective actions of various Local Councils nationwide which actively participated in the 2017 World Environment Day, International Coastal Clean-Up, Earth Hour, Massive Tree Planting, Mangrove Reforestation, Recycling, Solid Waste Management, and seminar-workshops on World Scout Environment Programme, we achieved a total of 10,904 Awardees of the World Scout Environment Badge, surpassing our 2017 Target of 5,000 awardees. This shows a 218% rate of accomplishment for the year under review.

WSEP Aims No. 1 to 5 have been included in various Regional and Local Council Scout Jamborees aside from the WSEP Workshops at the Council and Institutional Levels.







The Boy Scouts of the Philippines remains consistent as No. 1 Contributor in terms of Service Hours in the WOSM Platform at www.scout.org. We remained at Top 3 in terms of the number of Registered Online Users and number of Service Projects next to India and Indonesia, respectively.

This was brought about by the series of MoP Roadshows and integration of MoP Activities in various Regional and Council Scout Jamborees in Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao, It was actively promoted during the 2017 International Day of Peace last 21st September 2017, where Scouts from all Local Councils were involved in a wide variety of Peace initiatives such as Peace Run, Peace Starts with Me, Campfires, Tree Planting and Daily Good Deed among others.

JAMBOREE ON THE AIR/JAMBOREE ON THE INTERNET (JOTA/JOTI)



The JOTA/JOTI is an annual event in which Scouts and Guides all over the world communicate by means of amateur radio and internet. Short-wave radio signals carry their voices virtually to any corner of the world. It's the shear excitement of having a live conversation with a fellow Scout or Guide located in other parts of the world that attracts Scouts to participate in this event. This event also offers each Scout the experience that he or she belongs to a worldwide Movement. It offers an excellent opportunity for an exchange of ideas, cultures and habits. More than 2,500 Scouts from 25 Local Councils participated the 60th Jamboree-On-The-Air (JOTA) and 21st Jamboree-On-The-Internet (JOTI) held in Calaca, Batangas.









6TH ASEAN SCOUT JAMBOREE



A Jamboree is an event organized by Scouting for young people, where the Scout method is practiced according to the highest standard. It aims to provide a progressive, safe and enjoyable learning environment for the Scouts to enhance their physical, social, mental, emotional and spiritual potentials.

The ASEAN Scout Jamboree was organized by the ASEAN Scout Association for Regional Cooperation (ASARC) for its member countries, highlighting ASEAN cooperation and solidarity, promoting collaboration and mutual assistance for international scouting events.

Since the ASARC was founded, the following have been the five (5) installment of the ASEAN Scout Jamborees:

1st ASEAN Scout Jamboree - Philippines 2nd ASEAN Scout Jamboree - Indonesia 3rd ASEAN Scout Jamboree - Singapore 4th ASEAN Scout Jamboree - Thailand 5th ASEAN Scout Jamboree - Malaysia 28 December 1992 to 04 January 1993 16-28 October 2008 04-09 December 2010 27 November to 04 December 2013 15-20 September 2016 The 1st ASEAN Scout Jamboree was hosted by the Philippines in 1993. As the ASEAN celebrates its 50th Anniversary this year, we bring the 6th ASEAN Scout Jamboree to the place where it all started.

The Boy Scouts of the Philippines - Tagum City Council hosted the 6th ASEAN Jamboree with the theme "Growth and Stability" on November 27 - December 02, 2017 at the Energy Park, Apokon, Tagum City, Davao del Norte. The 6th ASEAN Scout Jamboree was held in a vast area of greens that was once an idle and reserved land developed by the City Government of Tagum to become a social development complex as well as a public recreational park. The Energy Park is a sprawling 31-hectare area that was originally envisioned as a government center where various national and regional government offices should be located to provide one-stop services for the public. The scenic landscape and spacious lawn of Energy Park is a site where local, national and international Scouting activities are frequently held.

JAMBOREE PROGRAM

The Jamboree Program offers a treasure trove of daily activities that challenges the Scouts to aspire for high ideals set by Lord Baden-Powell on the zest of quality scouting. The general objective of this program falls within the scope of the educational mission of the Youth Development Program, and the activities supporting these objectives should always be appropriately calibrated towards the participant's age group. The challenges were balanced and holistic in order to meet varied needs of each particular age group.

The Jamboree Program was divided into three (3) Major Components

- a) Main Modules
- b) Ceremonies, Gatherings and Reunions, Special Modules
- c) Special Events and Activities.

MAIN MODULES

Locally, participants have taken a look at the Scouting Movement with greater public acceptance and favorable image as an educational partner of the Department of Education, the Commission on Higher Education and other learning institutions. Scouting offers relevant programs, make real contributions and impact to the lives of Filipino youth and their communities.

Module 1: AQUATICS AND WATER FUN

A Scout Jamboree is not complete without Water Fun and Aquatics. This module strengthened the patrol and team system, camaraderie, fellowship and teamwork. It consisted of team building activities conducted along the shoreline of Hijo Plantation Resort.





Module 2: DISASTER RISK REDUCTION MANAGEMENT (DDRM) - WATER SAFETY

The DDRM module helped the participants learn skills in basic swimming, water safety and basic life support. This was also conducted at the shoreline of Hijo Plantation Resort.





Module 3: CAMP CRAFT

This module offered a series of Craft Skills that deal with our natural environment and resources. The activity covered a wide variety of outdoor interests including wild life in natural habitat, soil and water conservation, weather and ecology.







Module 4: JUNGLE ADVENTURE TRAIL

The Scouts learned jungle survival skills inside the Madaum Forest such as improvised shelter-making and finding directions while exploring nature. They were taught how to get to unfamiliar locations using their compass and maps.





Module 5: ASEAN FAITH AND BELIEF





ASEAN is a community of divergent identities composed of five major religions namely: Islam, Buddhism, Confucianism, Christianity and Hinduism. This module provided opportunities to Scouts and Leaders to nurture a culture of diversity, respect and accept one's faith and belief.

Module 6: CROSSROADS OF CULTURES

This module highlighted the way of life, customs and traditions of the ASEAN. All ASEAN countries were provided booths to showcase their culture and tradition, display their artwork and offer native food delicacies to all participants.





Module 7: ASEAN BETTER WORLD VILLAGE

This module promoted world peace to Scouts through the famous Messenger of Peace (MoP) dance. In addition, the module raised the Scouts' environmental awareness through "My Carbon Footprint" activity; their natural disaster preparedness through story telling; and their sense of art in Nature using indigenous materials.











Module 8: TEAM SPORTS FESTIVAL AND NATIVE GAMES

This module tested the Scouts' physical strength, flexibility, and agility through a series of individual and team sports and games.









Module 9: DISASTER RISK REDUCTION MANAGEMENT

This module provided learning opportunities and skills related to saving lives in times of disasters and calamities. It covered Emergency Rescues and Transfers, Basic Life Support, Bandaging, Wound Management, Care for Shock, Accident Prevention and a thorough discussion on the Disaster Risk Reduction Management Framework.









Module 10: GLOBAL DEVELOPMENT VILLAGE (GDV) AND CITY OF SCIENCE (COS)

The GDV programme was designed to develop the life skills of young people, enabling them to improve the quality of life in the community: sustainable livelihood, healthier population, clean environment and equitable society.

COS, on the other hand, is a melting pot of learning experiences geared towards Science and Technology. This included a wide variety of interesting trade exhibits and displays encompassing four (4) fields - Computer and Robotics; Information Communication and Technology; Life Sciences; Earth and the Universe.







Module 11: COMMUNITY SERVICE CHALLENGE

Every Scout is actively involved in the communities and regularly engages in community service projects and initiatives, and share their experiences to inspire others. Scouting also engages the government and other sectors of the society to pursue the establishment of community-based Scouting units in order to reach out the youth, the indigeneous people, the street children, children in especially difficult circumstances, people with disabilities, and other stakeholders, actively working to welcome all individuals without distinction.



BANGON, MARAWI!

The Boy Scouts of the Philippines, ever true to its commitment of carrying out its duty to others, has been actively participating in relief operations and outreach programs in order to help those who are adversely affected by crises. With the terrorists' attacks and law enforcement operations in Marawi City, the number of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) who are staying either in homes of relatives, or in designated evacuation centers, continue to rise.

In a National Memorandum released in June 2017, all operating units of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines were encouraged to take part in the relief operations by giving donations in any kind.

BSP-MOP EMERGENCY RELIEF OPERATION FOR MARAWI

In partnership with the WSB-APR under the Messengers of Peace Project, and in coordination with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), the Philippine Red Cross (PRC) and the Council Scout Executives of five Local Councils in Western Mindonao, the Boy Scouts of the Philippine National Office distributed a total of 1,000 relief packs to 1,000 families affected by the Marawi siege. These families are living in temporary shelters in Marawi and other adjacent cities and provinces. The distribution of relief goods was organized by the Regional Scout Director of Mindanao Regions, Jesus M. Meris. One relief pack consists of six (6) kilograms of rice, 18 pieces of noodles and nine (9) cans of sardines in an ecobag.

This project is a manifestation of the love and ideals of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines to help families living in extremely difficult conditions brought about by lawless elements while waiting to be relocated to government housing projects or to return to their new homes. The logistic support of the regional office in Mindanao, the Senior Scouts who provided helping hands in the actual distribution of relief goods, the physical presence and support of the members of the BSP National Executive Board in the distribution of relief goods, and the orderly management and supervision of the evacuation centers supervised by the DSWD and Red Cross played a big role in the success of the project.





The BSP Secretary General Rogelio S. Villa, Jr. and the Director for Administration/Project Officer Florencio B. Atinyao supervised the emergency relief operations in the following greas:

- Barangay Buru-an, Iligan City in coordination with OIC Mark Vincent R. Esquierdo of the BSP Iligan City Council;
- Cagayan de Oro City in coordination with CSE Rudy Guligado of the BSP Cagayan de Oro City Council;
- 3. Marawi City, Lanao del Sur in coordination with OIC Daud A. Mandia of the BSP Lanao del Sur-Marawi City Council;
- Lanao del Norte in coordination with OIC Ariel V. Sayre of the BSP Lanao del Norte Council; and
- 5. Misamis Occidental in coordination with CSE Roy G. Garbonera of the BSP Zandidap and Misamis Occidental Council.

POCOMON GO!



The Affiliated Network for Social Accountability in East Asia and the Pacific Foundation (ANSA-EAP) is a civil society partner of the DepEd-UNDP's Senior High School Computerization project. It provides third-party monitoring (TPM) through CheckMySchool, a participatory monitoring platform for public schools.

This TPM initiative is called Pocomon Go or People-Powered Computer Monitoring for Good Governance. Its mission was to track the delivery of computer packages (around 3500 computer units) to 66 high schools in Metro Manila.

Check MySchool's network partners include the Boy Scouts of the Philippines specifically the Metro Manila South Council represented by its Council Scout Executive Rex Francis Ynion and Division Superintendent Loreta B. Torrecampo, CESO V, of the Division of Las Pinas. Our volunteers were mobilized, trained and deployed for the readiness review, delivery monitoring, installation inspection, and report card visit.

Each school received 51 computers, a printer, LCD projector and screen. The Department of Education procured the computer packages through the procurement system of the United Nations Development Programme.





12TH NATIONAL ROVER MOOT



A total of 2,133 Rover Scouts and leaders from all over the Ten Scouting Regions of the country gathered once again for the 12th National Rover Moot at Pili, Camarines Sur on October 23 - 29, 2017. The Operation Smile Philippines Foundation, Inc. is a private, non-stock, non-profit charity organization, the first foundation to deliver free, re-constructive surgery and related health care to indigent individuals afflicted with congenital facial deformity in 1982.

The OSP has launched a new global initiative to eliminate the backlog of untreated oral clefts with initial implementation in the Philippines and thirty-four (34) other countries in Asia, Africa and South America. It serves as a lead organization tasked to carry out the aforementioned global initiative in the country.

CHAPTER 4 RESOURCENT RANAGEMENT

Effective and efficient deployment and allocation of resources assure the stakeholders of the organization's financial stability and self-reliance. The benefits should not only linger at the national level, but should also redound to all the Local Councils. The handling of the finances of the organization should be transparent, accountable and efficient.



RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

"Efficiently and effectively MANAGE the RESOURCES by maximizing revenues to provide sound financial stability for the benefit of the BSP and its benefactors."

This commitment, which has been drawn from BSP's Mission Statement to ensure BSP's financial stability, has started to bear fruit.

This report focuses on areas directly affecting the growth and stability of BSP's fixed assets from various income-generating properties.

Contracts, Joint Ventures and other Agreements

There was a remarkable increase in the number of lessees and partners in various properties of the BSP. Table shows an increase of 24.56% in tenancy from 57 in December 2016 to 71 over the same period in 2017:

The National Executive Board approved the transfer of the management, administration and supervision of the City Triangle Commercial Center in Davao City to the four local Councils of Davao, headed by the Davao City Council, effective 1 November 2017. The move would expedite the delivery of services including the prompt and efficient response to the lessees concerns.

The NEB also approved the transfer of management of the BP International Hotel in Mt. Makiling from El Cielito Hotels, Inc. to JVA Harmony Hotels, Inc. The move was due to the decision of the Board of Directors of El Cielito to separately operate their own hotels and the private hotels they manage. The change would not affect the income due to BSP as the terms and conditions in the new contract are basically the same as the old one.





REPAIRS, MAINTENANCE AND IMPROVEMENTS

Manila Property

Several installations, constructions, repairs and improvements of facilities at the Manila property were accomplished to ensure better services and safety of the staff and guests:



New air-conditioning units were installed on the 4th, 5th floor and 15th floors.



The new National Scout Shop (NSS) warehouse office located on the 3rd floor was constructed.



One of the accredited service providers of Mitsubishi facilitated the repair of the elevator traction machine as part of preventive assessment and maintenance.



- The first phase of the repair and restoration of the Generator Set was accomplished.
- A contract was made for Termite Abatement, Maintenance Program and General Pest Control Services.
- The procurement office located at the ground floor was improved by replacing its tiles and repainting its walls.

Makiling National Scout Reservation (MNSR) Camp

- Outdoor amenities such as Fireman's Wall, Commando Rope, Balancing beam, New Dimension Hole, Step Tire, Elephant Walk and High Ladder were installed in the camp to attract more clients. The Pavilion in the swimming pool area was repaired.
- Installation of internet connection for the camp which would enable swift flow of communications for more effective marketing and promotions was facilitated
- In order to enable a swift flow of communications to effective promotions and marketing, an internet connection was installed in the camp.

Capitol Hills Scout Camp (CHSC)

- Four picnic huts were constructed in the swimming pool area.
- The damaged submersible pump was replaced with a new one.

Davao City (City Triangle Commercial Center)

- The damaged submersible pump was replaced with a new one.
- The two pld centralized air-conditioning were replaced with five 5 ceiling mounted air-conditioning units.

ADHERE ICE TO EXISTING GOVERNMENT LAWS

The BSP adheres to high standard of public service to become compliant with the existing government rules and regulations.

- The BSP of the rties in Males, Manila, Cagayan De Oro and Iloilo were insured under the overnment Service Insurance System (GSIS).
- All contracts and agreements prior to execution were convenied to the Office of the Government Corporate Counsel (OGC review, and recommendations in order to ensure that the BSP is a pliant with the string government rules and lawful processes.

 OGCC is the legal counsel of the BSP being a Government Owned and Controlled Corporation GOCC.
- The BSP properties in Manila, Makati, Baguio, and Cebu were appraised by Philippine Appraisal Co. Inc. with an aggregate market value of Php 5,655 | 81,040.00.



Capacity Building

In order to strengthen the capacity of MNSR staff in using computers and manipulating basic programs for their records, reports, camp promotions and advertisements, a seminar was conducted last September 21-22, 2017 at Mt. Makiling, Los Baños, Laguna. This was spearheaded by Acting Director Arthur R. Sales of the Economic Enterprise Division.

INCOME GENERATING PROPERTIES

One way to assure our stakeholders of the organization's financial stability and self-reliance is the effective and efficient deployment and allocation of resources. Proper utilization and management of these properties will ensure that 80% of the organization's budget will come from these assets and become less dependent on membership fee. The benefits should not only linger at the national level, but should also redound to all the Local Councils. All financial transactions of an organization should be transparent, accountable and efficient. The BSP established good governance practices on accountability and transparency in the utilization and management of resources in accordance with government rules and regulations.

Currently, BSP generates regular income from rental/lease of properties, waterworks system fees, power supply system fees, and others. The income generated in 2017 from these sources are shown in the following table:






THE NATIONAL SCOUT SHOP

With an aggregate sales of P121.9 million, contributed mostly by Local Councils and authorized dealers, the NSS recorded a 6.7% increase over its 2016 sales. With this, the NSS surpassed its commitment to contribute P120.5 million to the Corporation Operating Budget of the BSP for 2018.

True to its commitment to make the official uniforms available to a larger number of members, the NSS exerted effort to tap and authorize more would-be dealers to reach wider areas where Scouting is prevalent. Authorized dealers remained the major sales contributors covering 65% of the total sales last year. Local Councils, meanwhile, contributed 25% of the total sales, while the remaining 10% were sales from walk-in customers of the NSS shops.

As expected, Basic Uniform has the most number of items sold at P115.4 million or 94% of the total sales. Badges, Literature, and Paraphernalia also reached the P1 million mark with an aggregate amount of P4 million.



As expected, the Basic Uniforms had the most number of items sold with P115.4 million or 94% of the total sales. Badges, literatures, and Scouting paraphernalia reached the P1 million mark with a combined amount of P4 million.

For the year 2018, the NSS, once again, has been tasked to surpass its record with a new gross target of P172 million bearing P135.9 million net sales. While the NSS average annual sales growth in the past two years stood only at merely 6%, sales target for 2018 has been pegged at 11%. Amid this daunting challenge, the sales force of the NSS believes that, with the full support of the management as well as the cooperation of all NSS strategic partners such as the suppliers, Local Councils and authorized dealers nationwide, the 2018 target sales can be achieved.
