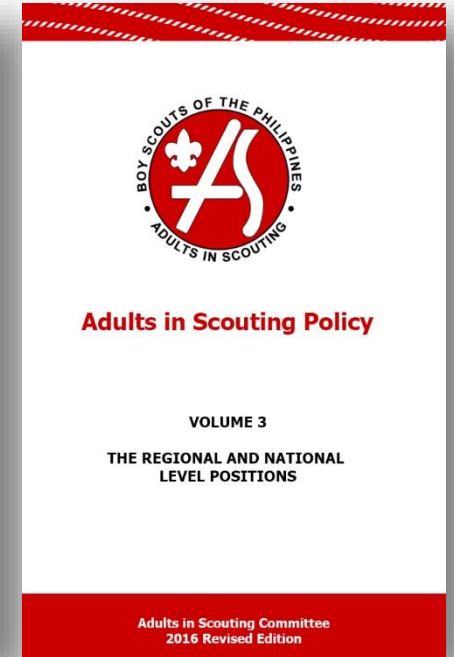
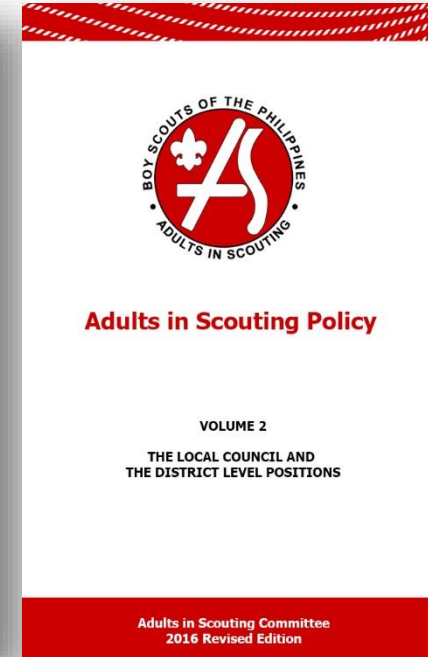
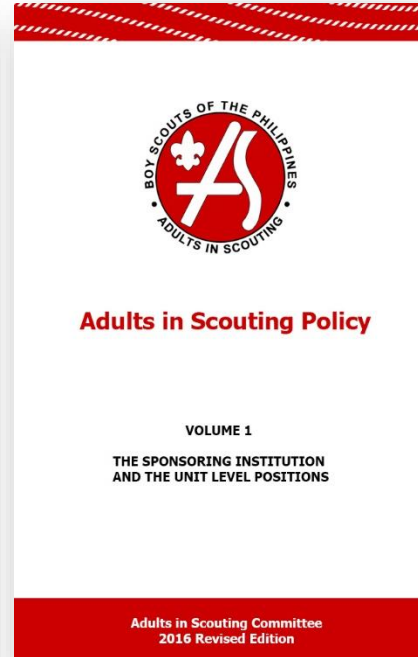

Adults in Scouting

As An Adult Scout Leader, I Will:

1. Respect my dignity and that of other Leaders in Scouting and in the community;
2. Demonstrate a high degree of personal responsibility, recognizing that at all times my words and actions are an example to the members of the movement and the community in general;
3. Act in accordance with Scouting principles at all times, aware that I am Scouting's mirror in action;
4. Act with consideration and good judgement in all my interpersonal relationships with Scout Leaders and young people in Scouting;
5. Respect everyone's right to personal privacy at all times, taking special care when and where sleeping, changing of clothing, bathing and ablution is associated with any Scouting activity;
6. Avoid potentially compromising situations by ensuring, where reasonably possible, that at least two adults are in attendance while supervising and/or accompanying Scouts and other youth members;
7. Not indulge in bullying, physical or verbal abuse, sexual harassment, neglect or any other types of abuse towards fellow Scout Leaders and Youth Members, with full awareness that these are conduct unbecoming of any member of the Movement;
8. Not use the Movement to promote my own beliefs, behavior or practices where these are not compatible with Scouting principles.

camp rules & regulations

The Jamboree Camp Rules and Regulation aims to provide a safe, accident-free, enjoyable and exciting learning environment to all Young People and Adults in Scouting during their Jamboree experience. It further seeks to promote BSP's initiatives on "Safety and Risk Management Policy for Safe Scouting Activity" specifically on Youth Protection and Keeping Scouts Safe from Harm (YP-KSSFH). The objectives of the Jamboree Camp Rules and Regulations are as follows:

1. Enumerate safety and risk management measures that will prevent accident during the Jamboree;
2. Set guidelines and standards in the conduct of Jamboree program and daily routine;
3. Provide appropriate outdoor manners and code of conduct that will safe guard the best interests of both Scouts and Leaders during the Jamboree;
4. Inculcate values and self-discipline to all the campers.

general conduct and behavior

1. The Scout Law. The Scout Law is the law of the Jamboree. The behavior and action of all Scouts and Adult Leaders shall be governed, guided and influenced by the tenets of the Scout Oath and Law.

2. Scout Uniforms. For smartness and good order, Scouts should wear their complete "Type A Scout" Uniform during formal and official gathering during the Jamboree such as Opening and Closing Ceremonies, Court of Honor, Conclave and Reunions. Appropriate attire will be announced from time to time as the need arises. Wear your Scouts uniform,

neckerchief and the official Scouts Jamboree emblem correctly at all times. See to it that placement of badges and insignias are correct and in proper order. You will meet thousands of your fellow Scouts from other parts of the country and from over-seas. Show that you wear your uniform proudly. Set a good example for others to follow.

3. Courtesy. Scouts and Adult Leaders shall observe the highest form of courtesy, politeness and respect to one another. One's identity in Scouting is greatly determined by his extent of personal conduct and manners in words and deeds.

4. Health and Sanitation. Camp orderliness, cleanliness, and sanitation shall be maintained at all times in the Jamboree camp site. Scouts in their Jamboree Contingents shall observe proper solid waste management through segregation of biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste at all times.

5. Do a good turn daily. Lend a helping hand where you see it can be useful to others. Do at least one good turn daily, especially in your daily Camp Chores.

6. Adult Leadership. Two (2) Deep Unit Leadership policy requires two (2) registered Leaders per Unit. One (1) Unit Leader and one (1) Assistant Unit Leader for every Troop and/or Outfit of the Jamboree Contingent. This shall provide supervision, monitoring and control to various "youth-planned and youth-lead" activities in the Contingent and in the Sub-Camp. Adult leaders are held responsible for the welfare and safety of the Scouts under their guidance and care. Basically, the Jamboree is for young people, a home away from home. Hence, adult leaders assume the role and responsibility of serving as second parents.

7. Youth Leadership. Membership in Small Group and Team/Patrol System shall be observed at all times. All Jamboree Contingents shall be responsible for assigning Scouts to their respective Patrols/ Crews and see to it that Leadership is in order and responsibilities are explained to each member.

keeping scouts safe from harm

1. Proper Identification. All campers (Scouts and Adults) MUST wear their Jamboree Identification Card and Neckerchief at all times inside the Jamboree Campsite. Strictly NO ID, NO ENTRY policy is enforced. This shall prevent outsiders from getting inside the camp. Jamboree security personnel may apprehend campers without Jamboree IDs.

2. Child Abuse. All forms of abuse have NO PLACE in all Scouting activities, especially in a Scout Jamboree, this include Physical, Emotional, Psychological, Sexual Abuse and Neglect. Adult Leaders shall be responsible for looking after the welfare of Scouts under their care. Recognizing, reporting and handling of all forms of abuse shall be handled with utmost confidentiality and must be the primary concern of the Contingent, Sub-Camp and Jamboree Officials.

3. Personal Health and Hygiene. All campers are advised to take all necessary measures for their personal health and hygiene to prevent sickness and diseases inside the camp. Take a bath regularly. Wash your hands before and after eating. Drink at least 6-8 glasses of water a day and bring your own water canister/container. Wear hat/cap and sunglasses on sunny day and wear raincoat/poncho or windbreaker during rainy season. Make your own clothes line and see to it that wet clothes are not kept inside the tents. Clean your tents every day, open tent window and door cover to allow air and sunlight every morning.

4. Hazing and/or Corporal Punishment. All forms of hazing, physical initiation and/or corporal punishment are NOT included in any parts of Scouting activity most especially during Scout Jamboree. Report any incident of hazing and/or corporal punishment to your contingent, sub-camp and jamboree officials.

8. Punctuality. Punctuality and promptness shall be observed religiously at all times in the Jamboree. It is the prime concern of adult leaders to keep posted with the mandates of the Jamboree management covering attendance in all Jamboree Modules, Activities and Programs.

9. Prohibitions. Hard drinks, liquors, intoxicating beverages, smoking, gambling and illegal drugs and all forms of vices are absolutely not allowed in the jamboree.



5. Appropriate Clothing and Attire. Some activities in the Jamboree may include certain element of risks and should never be undertaken without proper preparation, equipment, clothing attire and safety measures. This include water activities, high adventure courses such as rappelling, rock climbing, obstacle course, challenge valley and other specific outdoor exercises as may deemed appropriate by the person in authority.

6. Separate Tent Accommodation. All Jamboree Contingents shall see to it that enough tents are provided for everyone either individually or by groups of 2-3 Scouts depending on tent capacity. It is a matter of policy in the World Scouting as adopted by the BSP to ensure that Scouts must have a separate tent accommodation from their adult leaders. Likewise, female scouts are also separated from male scouts and female adult leaders. This shall protect both the interest and privacy of all Scouts and Adults in Scouting during Jamborees.

7. Separate Shower and Bathing Facilities. Shower and bathing facilities are provided by the Jamboree Organizing Committee under the Physical Arrangement and Camp Development Services. This can either be assigned per Sub-Camp or per Jamboree Area. By World Scouting policy as adopted by the BSP, all shower and bathing facilities must be separated for all Male Scouts, Female Scouts, Male Adult Leaders and Female Adult Leaders respectively. If not, separate time for male and female use should be scheduled and posted for showers, the buddy system should be used for latrines by having one person wait outside the entrance and provide each rooms/cubicles with "occupied" and "vacant" board signs and/or inside latches.

8. Respect Young People's Privacy. As part of BSP's YP-KSSfH policy. All adult leaders shall respect the privacy of Scouts especially during bathing, changing clothes, sleeping and resting. Adult Leaders are prohibited to join their Scouts upon the observance of TAPS and Lights Out period, except in emergency situations.

9. Respect Adult Leader's Privacy. Same principle applies to the privacy of Adult Leaders. Scouts are not allowed to join their leaders while taking shower/bath, changing clothes, sleeping and resting. Scouts are not allowed to enter their Leader's tent upon the observance of TAPS and Lights Out period.

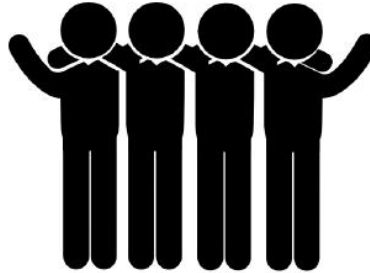
10. Buddy System. Jamboree Contingent and Adult Leaders shall arrange their Scouts "Buddy System". Going around the Jamboree Campsite, touring other Sub-Camps, making an errand to the Jamboree Market, Scout Shop, Jamboree Plaza and other places, Scouts should go with their Scout Buddy at all times.

11. No Bullying. Bullying in ALL FORMS is totally NOT ALLOWED in all Scouting activities, especially during Scout Jamborees for both Scouts and Adults in Scouting. Report Bullying to your Contingent Officials, Sub-Camp Director and Jamboree Officials to take necessary actions.

12. Digital Privacy and the Social Media. While taking "selfie" and "groupie" photos, pictures and images are common post in all social media platforms, utmost decency and courtesy must be observed at all times during the Jamboree. By mandate of BSP's YP-KSSFH policy, digital privacy in social media prohibits taking pictures, photos and images of Scouts and Adult Leaders in their private moment such as taking shower or bath,



changing clothes, at the comfort rooms, while sleeping and resting. Such photos, pictures and images that may cause public display of affection (PDA), feeling uneasy and uncomfortable to Scouts and Leaders involved must be immediately resolve by deleting such photos, pictures and images by the owner of the social media account.



13. No Secret Organization. All Scouting programs and activities for Scouts and Leaders or any part thereof is open to all. Parents, other stakeholders and the general public can come and visit to observe their children. BSP do not recognize nor accredit any secret groups, association, or clubs inside the Scouting or any part of its program, especially during Scout Jamborees. All programs and activities must be sanctioned by the Jamboree Organizing Committee.

14. No One on One Contact. To avoid circumstances and situation that will compromise the safety of Scouts and integrity of Adult Leaders. One-on-one contact between adult leaders and Scouts is not permitted, especially during private moment such as taking shower/bath, changing clothes, sleeping and resting period. In situations the required personal meetings and conferences, such as counseling and Troop Leader's Minutes, the meeting is to be conducted in view of the adults and scouts.

Safety and Risks Management

1. Leaving Jamboree Premises. Proper permission to go out of the Jamboree site shall be secured by the adult leaders and the Scouts from their respective contingent heads. Security logbook shall be kept by all Contingents and the Jamboree security personnel at all times.

2. Emergency Preparedness. In case of emergency, Scouts should keep calm and do not panic so as not to cause uncontrollable and insensible disorder and stampede in the Jamboree. Report any emergencies immediately to the nearest first aid stations, sub-camp and/or Jamboree Headquarters. The Jamboree Administration shall post all Emergency Hotline Numbers in all Sub-Camps and crowded areas for easy access. Firearms are absolutely prohibited at all times in the Jamboree. Deadly weapons have to be deposited with the Security Officers at the Gate entrance for safekeeping.

3. Accident Prevention. Try to anticipate and prevent accident at all times. The unexpected can happen anytime. Axes, bolos and other sharp tools should be properly masked when not in use. All Patrol/Troop Camp Tools, Gadget and Equipment such as kitchen knives, claw hammer, mallet, hand axe, pick mattock, hacksaw blade, shovel, trowel, rake and bolos are placed in Tool Rack and/or kept in Patrol/Troop Boxes when not in use.

4. Open Fires. Be careful with the use of fire. Report uncontrolled open fires to the nearest sub-camp and Jamboree administration. If a tent is on fire, get occupants out, drop the tent down and cover it with wet blanket to stop the fire. Contingents using pressurized gas cylinder and/or kerosene stoves should take extra care after cooking. Gas, kerosene and/or fire woods should be kept dry at all times and away from tents and storage area. There should be a designated area for Camp Lays and Fire Places.

TO : Regional Scout Directors, Council Scout Executives and Officers-In-Charge

SUBJECT : GUIDELINES FOR HOSTING AND CONDUCTING A SCOUT JAMBOREE

- In consonance with the mandate of the Boy Scouts of the Philippines to provide a "Progressive, Safe and Enjoyable Learning Environment to All" its members, and in compliance with the "Guideline on Risk Management Policy on Safe Scouting", we are pleased to inform everyone of the "National Guidelines for Hosting and Conducting Scout Jamborees".
- The Guidelines aim to ensure that maximum safety and precautionary measures are well taken care of by the Jamboree Organizing Committee and its working sub-committees, as well as the Jamboree Executive and Technical Staff, in order to preclude potential sources of accidents, loss of lives and damage to property in the conduct of National, Regional and Council Jamborees.
- The Guidelines outline the roles and responsibilities of the Regional Offices, Local Councils, Jamboree Organizing Committee, the National Office, and the pre-determined criteria for selecting a Jamboree site.
- These Guidelines recognize the main responsibility of the Program and Adult Resources Development, Risk Management and Operations Committees to support the WOSM's thrust in "Keeping Scouts Safe From Harm" by providing specific Policy Guidelines on **Child Protection**, especially in the conduct of Outdoor Activities at all levels.
- The Regional Offices and Local Councils hosting and/or organizing such event shall see to it that appointment of committee members to plan, organize and implement this guidelines are in place, especially the members of Camping and Activities Committee at the Local Council and at the regional levels.
- For information, guidance and compliance of all concerned.

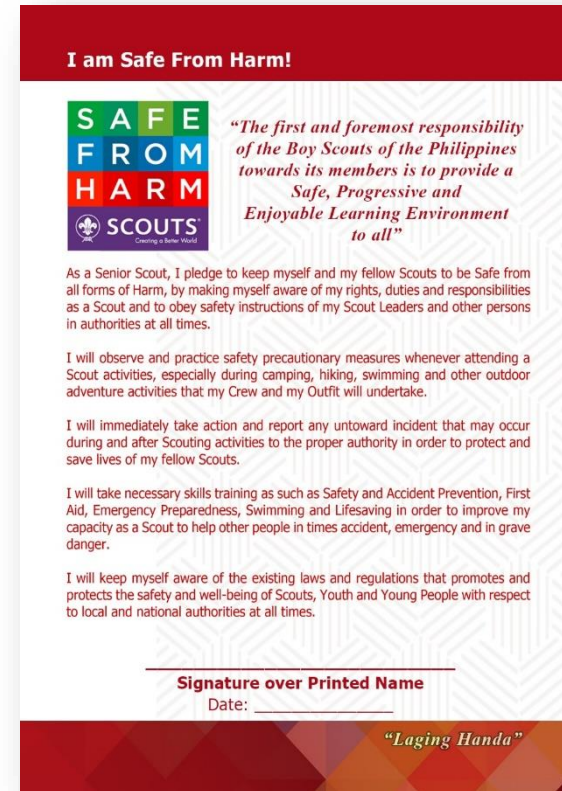
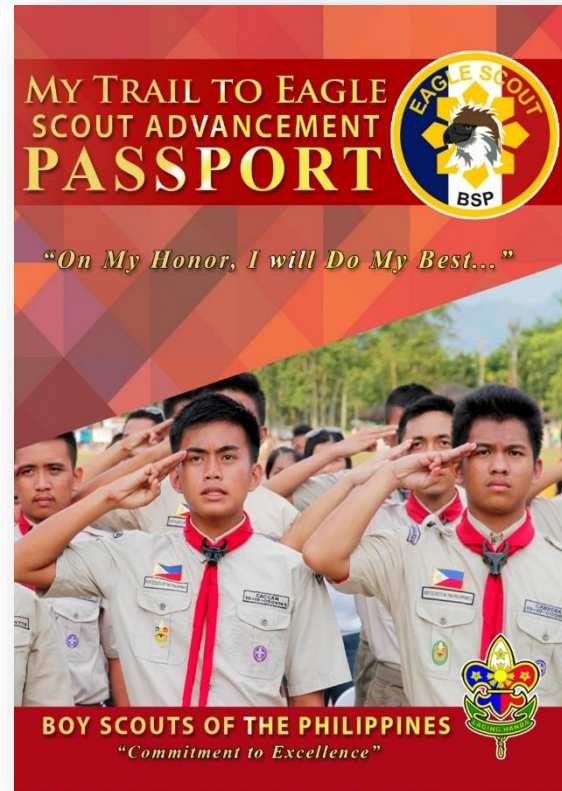

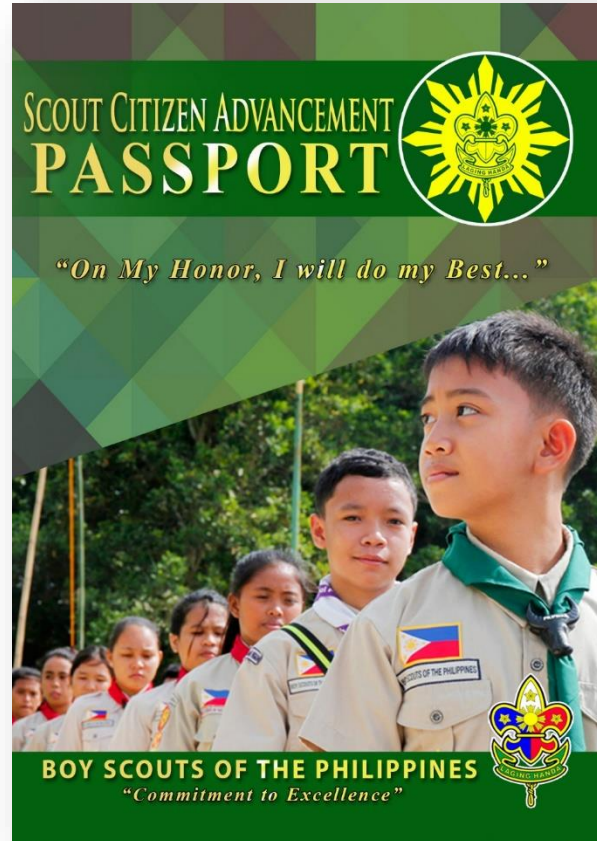

Safe from Harm

Learning about practicing the prevention and correct handling of various kinds of abuse, including bullying, physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse, neglect, and exploitation, which is a problem between Scouts, Scouts and adults, and adults.

The aim of "Child Protection," is to protect the Scouts from abuse that may occur between Scouts and adults.

Endorsing the United Nations' *Convention on the Rights of the Child* (UN CRC), Scouting has been working hard to ensure that children are protected from all forms of physical or mental violence, injury or abuse, neglect or negligent treatment, maltreatment or exploitation, including sexual abuse. We use the UN CRC's definition of a child as anyone less than 18 years old.

World Scouting emphasizes that the achievement of Scouting's Mission makes it essential for the Movement to provide young people with a "safe passage" based on respect for their integrity and their right to develop in a non-constraining environment.

The 36th World Scout Conference (Thessaloniki, 2002) adopted Resolution 07/02 on *Keeping Scouts Safe From Harm*, which sets out the position and policy on this issue for the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) and all its members.

You might ask why we need to address the issue of abuse in Scouting. By addressing this issue, we can protect the children and young people taking part in our programmes as well as ourselves. Good practice in protecting young people means ensuring that everyone working with children and young people is aware of the signs of potential abuse. The term "child abuse" is used to describe a range of ways in which people harm children and young people.

*We address **Safe from Harm** on the conviction that all adults and children have a right NOT to be abused. This is a fundamental human right. Human rights are non-negotiable.*

Abuse can take the form of:

- Bullying
- Physical abuse
- Emotional abuse
- Neglect
- Sexual abuse
- Exploitation

It is important to note that:
Young people can suffer from one or a combination of these forms of abuse. Abuse can take place at home, at school or anywhere young people spend time. In the great majority of cases, the abuser is someone the young person knows, such as a parent, teacher, relative, leader or friend.

The main objective is to ensure that no one will be exposed to abuse, but the focus is on young people. Good child protection practice means making sure that everyone is aware of signs of potential abuse. It is based upon the Declaration on the Rights of the Child and Human Rights.
